## IDITAROD OUTPUT WILL TAKE PREMIER POSITION NEXT YEAR

Returns from Fairbanks indicate that the output of gold from placer and quartz mines in that district will be some half a million dollars less this year than was the case in 1911. While the placer output will no doubt continue to decline from now on, it is hoped and believed the output from quartz mines in future seasons will more than compensate for the loss.



As in past years, the banner creek of the season was Goldstream, which produced about \$800,000, with Esther and its tributary, Eva creek, making a good second with about \$750,000, Dome produced \$600,000, Cleary \$375,000, Fairbanks \$300,000, Pedro and Chatanika \$250,000 each, the other creeks much smaller amounts.

The total output so far accounted for in the district is very little ahead of that from Iditarod, and when the returns are all in, it is not likely that the difference will exceed 15%. While we naturally are sorry to see the decline of the Tanana district as a placer camp, it must give us a certain amount of satisfaction to see Iditarod forging ahead to first place, which it undoubtedly will attain next year. The following gives the output of various interior camps to date: Iditarod, estimated \$3,250,000, Fairbanks district \$3,894,991, Hot Springs \$500,000, Gold Mountain \$40,000, Bonnifield \$25,000, Kantishna \$10,000.

The annual Seward traffic survey on the first mile of the Iditarod National Historic Trail along Ressurrection Bay started June 19 and ended on July17. The survey was conducted at about mile 0.5 of the Trail.

People and dogs on the Trail were counted at the same time each day for a week.



The busiest day was Sunday July 3, from 3-3:30 p.m. It was partly cloudy with a light south wind. The total on the Trail that day was 141:109 walking, 24 biking, 1 skateboarder, 3 on scooters, 3 running and one man in a wheelchair. There were also 13 dogs being walked.

The least number on the Trail was on July 7, 3-3:30 p.m. It was an overcast day with light rain. The total was 16 walking, with one dog being walked.
