## **Active Transportation Summit**



Alaska Trails is leading an effort to bring a statewide Active Transportation Summit to Anchorage on October 11 and 12. The Summit, co-sponsored by Anchorage Metropolitan Area Transportation Solutions, will feature active transportation expert Mark Fenton.

Active transportation refers to any form of human-powered transportation, such as walking, cycling, skiing, using a wheel chair or skateboarding.

The Active Transportation Summit will pave the way for the establishment of an Active Transportation Coordinator, which Alaska Trails hopes to implement in 2017. The Summit will be an opportunity for everyone interested in active transportation to gather, strategize and network.

The goals for the 2016 Active Transportation Summit are to:

- •Convene stakeholders to work on a draft Active Transportation Plan
- Agree on Active Transportation Coordinator position and work plan
- •Broaden active transportation in Alaska to incorporate both health and economic benefits
- •Develop a plan to engage business and politics leaders in active transportation

The overall goals for the Active Transportation program include:

- Increasing the amount of funding to projects that enhance active transportation
- Pursuing policies that expand active transportation opportunities
- Promoting awareness and safety of trail use, biking, walking and other active transportation
- Highlighting the health and economic benefits of active transportation
- •Enhancing and amplifying the work already being done to promote active transportation in Alaska

## From the past...

"Iditarod Pioneer" August 12, 1916 NEW MOTOR CARS RECEIVED BY THE MUTCHLER BROS.

The two motor cars ordered by the Mutchler Bros. for use on the Iditarod-Flat tramway have been received and will soon be in operation. These cars were expected here on the first up-river consignments this year, but because of the longshoremen's strike at Seattle they were left on the docks and their delivery delayed.

The heavier of the cars, equipped for heavy traffic, is fitted with two motors, and is geared for a speed of ten to twelve miles an hour. The combined horse-power is 44, and it is expected that it will be able to negotiate the somewhat steep grades of the tram line with ease. It is even possible that one motor will be sufficient, but the extra power was added to insure the success of the car. The lighter car, for passenger traffic, will be able to make much faster times and is expected to become a popular vehicle on the route between the two towns.

Considerable work, will be necessary on the track to prepare for the new cars, and men will be put to work on the improvements in few days.

"Iditarod Pioneer" August 26, 1916 SCHOOL TEACHER ARRIVES

Among the arrivals on Monday morning's boat from the Outside was Miss. Helen Grant who has been engaged by the trustees of the Otter school district to have charge of the school at Flat during the coming term, which commences September 4. Miss. Grant is well and favorably know in the district, having formerly been in charge of the school. She left here two years ago.

## **National Trails Day®**

American Hiking Society's National Trails Day® on June 4 offered Americans more trail activates than any year since National Trails Day® was launched in 1993. Nationwide, 2,381 activities including hiking, biking, horseback riding, trail maintenance, peddling, geocaching,



trail dedications and children's activities took place in all 50 states, Washington D. C. and Puerto Rico. The events brought out more than 168,000 people to explore parks and trails.

## 150th Anniversary of the Alaska Treaty of Cession

The Alaska Historical Commission has \$100,000 available for matching grants to assist with projects for the commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the Alaska Treaty of Cession. The application deadline is October 17, 2016. The grants are for research and publication projects, restoration of significant historic properties and community and heritage tourism programs. The programs's goals are to deepen the understanding of the history and significance of the event and 19th century Alaska and to encourage projects that address less well studied subjects and perspectives on the event.
