Jules Mead (1938-2017)

Jules Mead, long time Alliance board member and treasurer passed away April 18, 2017, surrounded by his family. Jules was born in Evanston, Illinois, to Paul and Louis Mead on December 20, 1938. He is survived by his wife, Leslie Mead, and four children, Brian Mead, Kelle Deluca, Jennifer Dawkins, and David Mead.



In 1965, Jules met Leslie in Evanston, Illinois, and married a year later. In 1972, with their young family, they made the trek to Alaska and immediately fell in love with its rugged beauty and vast opportunities. They settled in Wasilla and bought Teeland's Country Store.

In 1974 Jules gave a home to the newly formed Iditarod Trail Race, upstairs in Teeland's Country Store. He supported the Iditarod as a sponsor, volunteer, treasurer, vice-president, and executive director.

Jules was a great asset to the Alliance and will be greatly missed.

"Iditarod Pioneer" June 16, 1917

WILL FITTINGLY CELEBRATE GLORIOUS FOURTH OF JULY AT CREEK METROPOLIS

At a meeting of the business men of Flat last Tuesday evening the initial steps were taken looking to a fitting celebration of Independence day at the creek town. Committees were appointed and a general outline of the programs discussed, and within a short time the committees will be able to make some definite announcements. The sentiment is generally expressed that this year in particular extra efforts be put forth to make the national holiday one of patriotic demonstration *, and the efforts of the various committees will no doubt follow along those lines. While the time for preparation is limited, it has been shown heretofore that the lively creek town can organize a celebration of the nature proposed in an incredibly short period, and when the eventful day arrives it will be found that the plans have been carefully made and will be faithfully executed.

Great Outdoors Month

June is Great Outdoors Month. It started as Great Outdoors Week in 1998 and expanded into a month long event in 2004.

Here is Governor Bill Walker's Great Outdoors Month Proclamation:

WHEREAS, Alaska summers are filled with abundant opportunities for outdoor recreation as Alaskan families and visitors fish, hike, boat, bike, swim, and participate in many more activities that provide physical and mental benefits; and

WHEREAS, American kids today spend an average of 10 hours a day in front of a screen, and outdoor activity is touted by many leading health organizations as a remedy for the adverse effects caused by society's increasing inactivity; and

WHEREAS, diverse events during Great Outdoors Month provide all Alaskans, and especially our children, with exciting opportunities for recreation on the great waters, lands, and local park systems throughout our state, and these events help connect citizens of all ages to healthy, and fun outdoor gatherings; and

WHEREAS, the economic impact of outdoor recreation is both large and growing nationally, exceeding \$650 billion in annual expenditures, and in our state, where it is estimated at \$11.5 billion and supports thousands of jobs; and

WHEREAS, Alaska's 23 national park units, 8 State Park areas, 2 national forests, and more attract millions of visitors per year and many of our important cultural and historic events and traditions are linked to places in our state which are parts of national, state and local park systems; and

WHEREAS, the summer months are a crucial time each year for many Alaskans to spend time outdoors supporting themselves and their families through subsistence activities, filling freezers and pantries with supplies for the coming year. The ability to support one's family from the rich resources of our land is an important part of the Alaskan lifestyle and the heritage and culture of Alaska Natives.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Bill Walker, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF ALASKA, do hereby proclaim June 2017 as: Great Outdoors Month in Alaska, and encourage all Alaskans and visitors from other states and countries to explore and enjoy, protect and conserve Alaska's Great Outdoors.
