ICE HAS GONE WEST

What is probably accepted as the "official" time of the ice movement in front of Iditarod took place at 9:15 on last Wednesday evening, May 8, when it floated from its position between Willow and Richmond streets. There was no general run of ice until 2 o'clock on Thursday afternoon, when a jam below town gave way.

**THE M. T. CROSBY
GOT THERE FIRST**

The first vessel to reach St. Michael this season was the new Iditarod-built gasoline launch M. T. Crosby, which left here June 5 for Lower Yukon river points. It reached St. Michael last Wednesday, the 19th. In a telegram to her Iditarod agent, Mrs. M. T. Crosby, the boat's owner and manager, stated that the vessel may make a trip to Kotlik and back to Andreofsky.

The message also stated that the steamship Victoria was 50 miles off St. Michael awaiting ice clearance.

50/40 celebration in Seward

On Sunday June 3, the Seward Iditarod Trail Blazers will host a celebration of the 50th anniversary of the National Trails System Act and the 40th of the Iditarod National Historic Trail at the Branson Pavilion in Seward, located at Ballaine Boulevard and Adams Street from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m.



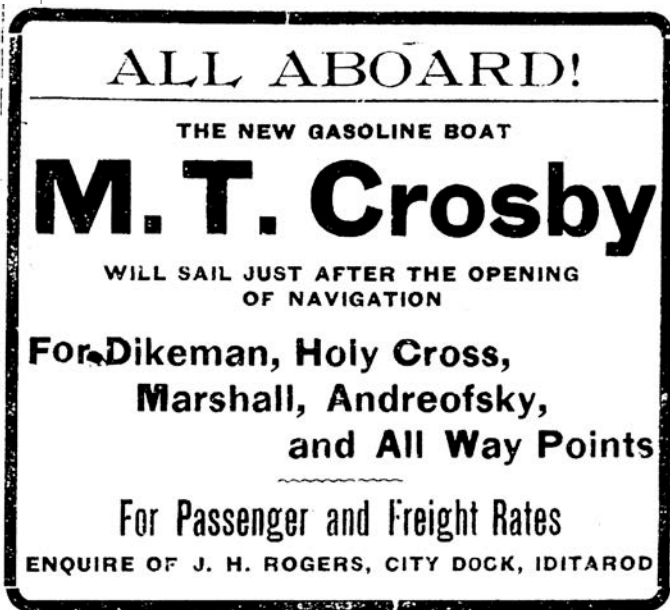
There will be hot dogs and other refreshments, as well as door prizes.

CROSBY SAILS MONDAY

On Monday next at 10 a.m. the new launch M. T. Crosby, with the barge Fanny Gray in tow, will leave the city dock for Lower Yukon river points. J. H. Rogers, the general freight and passenger agent, announces the cargo will begin going aboard about tomorrow morning and that all will be in readiness at the sailing time. Several passengers have engaged accommodations for the boat's initial voyage. The fare to Fortuna Ledge is \$40 and to Andreofsky \$45. Captain Smith has been putting the finishing touches on the craft this week, and reports every detail in splendid form.
