UNSEASONABLE WEATHER
MAY INTERFERE WITH MAIL

After being without mail service for several weeks, the people of this district may be deprived of that luxury for a longer period than usual this year unless there should be a sudden change in weather conditions.

The winter mail service via the Seward trail takes effect on November 1. But because of the mild weather the streams and lakes and swamps are still free from ice, and there is practically no trail. It is therefore unlikely that the service will commence on the first of the month. It is probable that similar trail conditions prevail at the Knik end of the route, and that there may be a delay in the dispatch of the mail for the Interior.
